2. Minutes of Meeting – January 2018

Minutes agreed as a correct record.

3. Presentations

4. Fife Councillors.

4.1. Jane Ann Liston.

4.1.1. Marriage Registration in St Andrews

Cllr Liston reported that the situation was worse than she'd thought. The hours in the Registration Office were now being cut to three half days a week in St Andrews. It had also been reported to her that some people trying to register a death in St Andrews couldn't get an appointment anywhere in Fife so were having to go to Auchterarder or Perth. Fife Council has admitted that they want to stop all registrations in St Andrews altogether. The official with whom she had been having contact had recently suggested that they should have a meeting to discuss the matter, so she and Cllr Verner will meet with the official and will report back to the CC the outcome. She felt that the decision was totally unacceptable and mentioned the lack of consultation on the matter. She had checked the policy about the requirements of officials to consult with Councillors on issues in their area and believed that this had not been followed. The official had apparently told Cllr Liston that it wasn't always "practical or appropriate to consult on changes" and he hadn't informed Councillors of how much money this might save Fife Council. Mr McLeod asked if this might include stopping registering births locally and Cllr Liston thought it might eventually be the case. Ironically a new sign put up at the St Andrews office still mentioned the registration of births, marriages and deaths! Mr McLeod asked the meeting if Cllr Liston could be asked to pass on the dissatisfaction of the

CC to Fife Council officials about this decision. Dr Shepherd reiterated this request a bit later and members supported the statement to be passed on by Cllr Liston to Fife Council.

4.1.2. Sustainable Transport Summit

Cllr Liston announced that there was to be a cycling summit in St Andrews to take place on the 5th March in the town hall. The Fife Administration spokesperson Cllr Alistair Craik (sic) will be attending. Mr McLeod wondered if the CC was to be invited? Cllr Liston thought the CC would be invited. Miss Uprichard wondered whether Sustrans were involved in this meeting? Cllr Liston advised she didn't know but would check.

4.1.3. Bus Timetable/ Virtual Branch Line

Cllr Liston informed the meeting that the timetable for buses and interconnecting train services in North East Fife area was incomplete with some bus services missing on the timetable. Only the 99s were on this timetable and anyone trying to check on the full services would have to check the Travel Scotland Traveline site to get full bus details. She felt that this wasn't satisfactory. Cllr Liston had raised the issue with the appropriate department and was waiting for an outcome of her enquiry.

4.1.4. Public Conveniences in St Andrews

Cllr Liston had recently attended with other councillors a meeting relating to public conveniences. The meeting was chaired by Dorothea Morrison and was connected to St Andrews Partnership. Mr Jerry Beaulier who was also at the meeting had asked what had happened to the money, which Fife Council had received from the sale of the former West Port toilets? He thought that that should have gone into funding conveniences in the St. Andrews area. She is to ask officials about where the money from the sale had gone and how it had been used.

4.1.5. Rusty Railings

Cllr Liston had discovered that the rusty railings above the station car park were not on an adopted road but held under a Common Good title according to a Mr Duncan in Transportation Services. Cllr Liston had then emailed Corporate Assets to try and inform the responsible budget holders of the repairs needing to be done but hadn't had a reply to date. Cllr Liston had spoken to Clean and Green Dave as they have been working on some railings but couldn't do all railings in the town. However Cllr Liston suggested that if the CC could help fund the consumables for such work by Clean and Green that might help progress the maintenance. Mr McLeod mentioned he'd been approached by Dave from Clean and Green on this matter of consumables. He suggested that if Dave could give the CC an estimate for the cost of materials he thought that the CC might be persuaded to assist with costs.

4.1.6. Leuchars Parking Drop-off

Cllr Liston commented upon the eventual completion of the work to mark the areas for drivers dropping off passengers to park in on a short-term basis following the loss of such parking along the road nearby.

4.1.7. Harbour Buildings issue

Mr Jardine mentioned that the runes etc of the buildings used by the fishermen at the harbour and which was a common good responsibility had not been cleaned. Cllr Liston replied that there was a complication in that as she acknowledged these areas were common good but thought responsibility had been transferred to the fishermen. She agreed to check out the ongoing situation. Mr Neil Cunningham-Dobson who is a trustee of the Harbour Trust thought that Fife Council still had some responsibility as the premises were listed buildings and the Trust might be taking over responsibility but this was taking longer than expected. He hoped there would soon be improvements to the premises. Mr Dobson had also been doing research into the history of ownership/responsibility in the harbour area and had discovered an early charter from the 1620/30s. The harbour he said was common good and Fife council managed some of it on behalf of the common good. He confirmed that the Harbour Trust did not own the harbour but manage it for the benefit of the common good. He commented upon the great difficulty in finding out even the boundaries of the land, which was common good in the

harbour area as paper work had been lost making his attempts to find out definitive answers very difficult. Cllr Liston added that she'd discovered an email sent from Fife council Estates dept, which had indicated that work needing done would have to be funded from the common good budget and Property Services would undertake the work once the financial, go ahead was given.

4.2. Dominic Nolan

4.2.1. Signage issue

Cllr Nolan reported that he'd recently attended a meeting of the St Andrews Partnership where signage issues had been discussed. One particular signage issue related to a couple of signs on the West Sands just after the bus drop off point suggesting to car park users to leave a small donation towards their parking. It is not known who put up the signs and the donation box is unlocked. There was a feeling that the signs and donation box should just be taken down, as they were serving no useful function. CC members supported the idea of removing the signs and donation box.

4.2.2. Proposed Church Street Crossings

Cllr Nolan briefly raised the issue of the proposed Church Street Crossings but had noted that the issue was up for discussion in the CC agenda and decided to leave discussion until that item came up under matters arising.

4.3. Brian Thomson

4.3.1. Students Association Duct work

Cllr Thomson reported he'd been recently at a North East Fife Area Committee Planning Meeting at which a number of St Andrews planning matters had been raised. One related to the controversial ductwork at the Students Association being proposed to cover extractors, which hadn't had planning permission and to which neighbours to the building had objected on visual and other grounds. This was a retrospective application to camouflage the offending device and this had been given planning permission.

4.3.2. Bield Housing – Abbey Walk

Cllr Thomson also reported on the attempt by Bield to sell so-called special needs housing due to a lack of take up by prospective purchasers due to their cost. Bield had asked to reduce the age of eligibility to purchase the houses be lowered to 50 from 60. Councillors refused this despite officials suggesting it should be accepted. Miss Uprichard asked about the definition of special needs housing and how it was decided and who decided it. Cllr Thomson said that there was a definition in Fifeplan of what constituted special needs housing. He acknowledged that the current policy was a lot tighter than it had been when the Bield Housing had been approved. It was now clear that there would be an age limit and anyone eligible would generally have to have an additional need.

4.3.3. Ladebraes

Cllr Thomson reported that Fife Council staff had surveyed a number of trees as requiring either felling or remedial work in the Ladebraes following concerns raised by Dr Shepherd. 10 trees had been identified, with one to be felled and 9 to have remedial work. Permission to do the work had been obtained. Most of the trees were nearer the Cockshaugh end of the path. Work would take place before the bird-nesting season.

4.3.4. HMO Policy Review Workshop

Cllr Thomson informed the meeting that there had been a long awaited workshop on the HMO situation the previous week. The consultants' recommendation was that the town centre moratorium should be lifted and a threshold is being recommended for the area outside the conservation zone. There is to be a 15% threshold per hundred houses in the areas outwith the conservation zone. Cllr Thomson acknowledged that he didn't agree with all the findings in the report. He said there were a number of basic errors such as the population of the town. After the workshop it was felt that local groups needed to have their say. There will be a second workshop with local groups looking at the report and airing their views before the final

report goes to the Area Committee for a decision to be taken as to how to implement the conclusions. He hoped there would be something before the summer. Mr McLeod commented that the Planning Committee had had a couple of hours chatting to one of the consultants, which had been useful.

4.3.5. Fife Council Budget

Cllr Thomson advised that the Fife Council budget was due to be set by 22nd February. He admitted there would be cuts, as the Council would have less money at a time when service demand was increasing.

4.3.6 Uplighters

Councillor Thomson reported that the Uplighters in the town centre, which hadn't been working, had been fixed and some at the West Port would need replaced probably in the next couple of months. Some in Market Street had had water ingress so there was a bit of uncertainty about them.

4.3.7 Reporting Pot Holes

Mrs Fraser informed Cllr Thomson that she'd had an issue when reporting potholes to Fife Council. When she'd been unable to give the officer or official the name of the road the referral wasn't accepted. Cllr Thomson thought this response was unacceptable and said he'd speak to an officer on the issue.

4.3.8. Rusty Signposts

Mrs Fraser wondered who was responsible for the care of the metal mileage signposts on the way into the town as she thought some looked very rusty? Cllr Thomson said that the officer to contact was a Mr Kevin Smith. He'd be happy to contact him on Mrs Fraser's behalf or could give her his email to contact him direct.

4.3.9. Cycle Parking

Mr Marks asked Cllr Thomson if there was any update on the cycle parking? Cllr Thomson in reply said he'd been a bit alarmed a few weeks ago when speaking to Mr Stirling of Fife Transportation Service who'd mentioned that the cycle racks might lose funding for the next financial year if they weren't approved in the near future. He contacted the Convenor of the Transport Committee who told him the money for the racks was being safe guarded. Cllr Thomson asked what was happening to the planning application? There had been an attempt to blame the CC as the planning committee of the CC had put in objections and suggested amendments. However Cllr Thomson didn't accept this excuse but still hadn't had a concrete answer to the delay. He hoped that at the next committee the applications would be determined. Mr McLeod commented that he'd raised the issue of the cycle parking by Hope Park/ Martyrs Church where there were the old slots in the ground which he viewed as useless as there was nothing to which to attach bikes. He thought it would be nice if a group such as St Andrews Space for Cycling might come up with a proposal to replace these slots.

4.4. Ann Verner

4.4.1. Crossing Light South Street

Mr McLeod acknowledged he'd forgotten to mention a couple of notes sent to him when Cllr Verner was absent in January. He apologised for his oversight and informed the meeting that Cllr Verner had reported that the crossing light in South Street had been replaced and was now functional.

4.4.2. Potholes

Mr McLeod also reported that Cllr Verner had also been taking photos of potholes and sending them to officials.

4.4.3. Thanks to Recreation Committee re Xmas Party for Senior Citizens

Cllr Verner had also wanted her thanks passed on to Mr Jardine and his helpers for the successful Senior Citizens party in December.

5. Planning Committee

Miss Uprichard started by saying that she wouldn't go through the details of the planning committee minutes but wanted to discuss a planning issue, which had divided the Planning Committee. This related to the route of the Link Road required for the new school and eventual Western Development. Three committee members had put in personal objections to the Toucan Crossing proposal and suggested that the preferred route was Route B not Route A. Six other planning members and a couple of other CC members supported a detailed paper written by Dr Goudie. Both objections were initially accepted and put on the Planning website, but the one with signatures was removed. He asked why one objection had been removed but hasn't had an answer to date. The official to whom she'd spoken had also claimed that the objection removed had been a late one but Miss Uprichard didn't believe that there was any such thing and that objections could be put in until the time the committee process started. She had written today to the official pointing out that since the 18th December closing date for comments 19 further documents had been put of the web and that no one had therefore had a chance to comment on those additional documents. Her letter written as an individual was asking whether given the circumstances the application would be re-advertised so that the additional documents could be properly examined and assessed. She also asked why the objection signed by 6 CCs had been taken off the website.

Miss Uprichard then read out the next paragraph of her letter, "You said that this was a late objection and did not answer my question querying this decision. I refer you to Fife Council document; 'Commenting upon an Application' updated September 2017. On a consultation period the Council says that planning law requires that a period of 21 days and 28 days for applications subject to an EIA for comments to be submitted. Fife Council allows additional time so that you have 30 days to submit your comments and 40 days for an EIA". As Miss Uprichard added this meant that the final dates for submission of comments should have been the 27th December. This would have covered the objection sent in by the 6 CC Planning Committee members and other late objections. She wondered if Councillors could check out on the issue of the 30 days etc. She hoped that the application would be re-advertised.

Dr Goudie clarified that the letter attributed to him had also included a lot of input from other members of the planning committee so he couldn't take full credit for the content.

5.1. Committee Reports

6. Matters Arising

6.0. St Andrews Space for Cycling

Mr McLeod reminded the meeting he'd been in communication with Mr Tony Waterston and had requested documentation about their plans for the CC to consider.

6.1. Greyfriars Garden

Mr McLeod said he'd written the letter of support, which was then submitted, to the Scottish Government.

6.2. South Street/ Church Street Crossings

Mr McLeod said the meeting had come to a view and Fife Councillors had taken this on board. He added that after that there had been the serious incident at the north end of Church Street by Bonkers. He asked the meeting if this incident had changed members' views on the crossings? Cllr Nolan informed the meeting that before the accident the item relating to the possible crossings was not going to be included by officials in the next Area meeting on 14th February. Then it was put back into the agenda, a fact, which had annoyed him as he said he disliked this type of reaction to an event, and the way it would then be presented. He asked for the definitive view of the CC so that he could be clear about matters when raised at the Area Committee on the 14th February. Mr McLeod reminded members that they should be careful in what they said given that there were possibly ongoing police enquires which could lead to a criminal prosecution. He asked members if they wished to change their view? The consensus

of the majority of members was to maintain the previous decision. Mr Dobson felt that the incident also reflected the need for both pedestrians and motorists to have better education as it wasn't uncommon to see pedestrians walking on to the road oblivious to motorists because they were absorbed in their phones/headphones and motorists had to be more aware of such hazards. He thought that an education campaign was required.

Miss Uprichard commented that quite a few of the improvements installed by Fife Council in the town had not been improvements in her view. She reflected upon the changed parking in Market Street and the problems she felt this diagonal parking had created. She thought that officials were more concerned at the time in losing parking income if a system of parallel parking instead of diagonal had been introduced. She also commented upon the raised cobbled areas across Double Dykes Road and Market Street and how confusing these were to pedestrians who sometimes assumed they were proper crossing points. She felt that these were areas where accidents could happen because some pedestrians thought they had the right of way in crossing against traffic. She also didn't think that the accident at Church Street was relevant to the crossing proposed in Church Street.

Mr McLeod confirmed with members that they would not be changing their previously stated views in the January meeting.

6.3. Storehouse Trolley

Mr McLeod informed the meeting that this was purchased and delivered.

6.4. Holy Trinity Church Action Group

Mr McLeod reminded CC members that he'd arranged a meeting of anyone interested in the CC input to this matter but no one attended.

6.5. Reports from Representatives

Mr McLeod said he was aware that the meeting never really heard much from CC members who were attending meetings as CC reps. He felt that it would be good to have a note to confirm what these reps were doing and that they were attending the relevant groups. He added that if members were unable to fulfil a commitment they should let the CC know so that action could be taken to remedy the problem.

6.5.1. Cathedral Lighting Group

Mr Cunningham-Dobson reported that the plan was to install or reinstate what had been at the cathedral previously. He had consulted the Northern Lighthouse Board to check on possible light pollution issues but they'd seen no problems with the proposals. So there is a push to get the lights functional by applying for funding to get work started. The lighting would be LED and the idea would be to restore the basic original lighting with up to date systems and on special occasions have special displays. He thought that by the summer the lighting might be installed. Mr Newton asked about the group discussing the lighting issue and how it worked? Mr Roberts advised that Historic Scotland who manage the site had very stringent rules on any changes to the management of the site.

6.5.2. Cosmos Centre

Mrs Harding reported that the Cosmos continued to be very successful with a popular after school club. There is however a bit of a problem with outreach work due to funding issues.

6.5.3. Holy Trinity Action Group

Mr McLeod reported back on a meeting of this group and said he'd circulate aims and objectives to CC members.

6.5.4. North East Fife Safety Panel

Mrs Fraser reported that this organisation had decided not to come under the umbrella of the CC.

6.6. Microphones

Dr Shepherd had raised the issue of the CC requiring a modern audio system for use at a previous meeting. He had undertaken some research and had come with a price, which at the time was viewed as quite high and the idea did not come to a conclusion on that occasion. Dr Shepherd still felt that the CC should seriously consider changing the current system to a modern one with the potential benefits that this might bring to conduct of the meetings. He acknowledged again that the price might be off-putting. He informed the meeting that non-wired microphones would be double the wired price at around £10K. He had obtained a quote for a microphone system costing about £4500 for 22 microphones plus a management system for the Chair. He added that with the management system a recording of the meeting could be made on to a data stick. He confirmed that he was still in favour of updating the microphones but would see if the meeting would accept his suggestion. He thought that the sound quality was better. He thought that he could get someone to give a demonstration. Mr McLeod agreed that he'd raised the idea and that it would be a facility for the premises. Mr McLeod proposed that a trial of the microphone system should be arranged. Mr Roberts reminded the meeting that the current microphones were the property of Fife Council. He wondered whether with our purchase we would be the owners of the new system or would it be donated to Fife Council? Mr McLeod thought it would remain the property of the CC. Mr Roberts was in favour of a new system. Mr Newton thought that the new system might be beneficial as he struggled at times to hear some members because of the way they spoke and where they were located. Dr Goudie wasn't convinced that it was justifiable to spend the sum involved on a microphone system and he didn't have difficulty in hearing people. Mr McLeod thought that there might be other sources of funding to contribute towards the overall cost and he suggested the possibility of the Common Good Fund and the St Andrews Trust if it was appropriate. Mr Marks whilst he understood Dr Goudie's reasoning he said that he could also understand Mr Newton's concerns. He said that it wasn't always easy for secretarial purposes for him to clearly hear every member and his recording on laptop did have some limitations due to the size of the meeting and the tendency of members not always to speak towards the recording system or use the current microphones. Mr Marks supported the idea of a better quality system as it might enhance his ability to accurately record the minutes. Mrs Harding thought it seemed quite expensive for the number of times it would be used on an annual basis. Mr McLeod asked Dr Shepherd if the company would set something up or lend the CC some mikes on a trial basis. Dr Shepherd wasn't certain but agreed to speak again to the company and see if they might agree to visit and give a demo.

7. Committee Reports

7.1. Recreation Committee

No meeting had held since the last CC meeting but Mr Jardine acknowledged that he would need to set one up soon.

Nothing to add to report circulated earlier in the day. Dr Goudie asked members to note Starlink's fundraising Wine Tasting on Friday 23rd February @ 19.30.

8. New Business

8.1. Community Engagement

Dr Shepherd opened by saying that the CC didn't do community engagement well according to some local members of the St Andrews community. He added that the CC weren't alone in this deficiency with many local authorities struggling to satisfy the public.

He asked how could matters in St Andrews be improved? His proposal was to create a centre able to be used as an access point for the community. He suggested that the former pet shop premises below the Burgh Chambers could be such a place if it could be rented for a peppercorn rent from Fife Council. He thought that this could be a centre for a variety of local groups to have a meeting place as well as the CC and its committees. He thought it could also be a place which the CC could use as a drop-in centre for the public to meet CC members and see what the CC was doing if its activities were on display as photos and posters etc. He also thought it could be used by Fife councillors, the MSP, MP and MEP for their surgeries. He suggested that the CC could have bulletin boards up with topical questions seeking public views. Sub-letting to organisations such as Clean and green might be another way to use the premises. He proposed that if the idea was successful to call it the Saltire Centre. He felt that this could create positive publicity and set an exemplar standard for community councils nation wide. He'd also spoken to a Fife Council official Sheena Watson who has responsibility for community engagement. He proposed having her along to the CC to discuss this idea at the March meeting.

Mr McLeod acknowledged the need of the CC to be better in its work with the public as it had been under fire from some in the community on how it was seeking the views of the local community on various issues. Mr McLeod added that he'd held his first surgery downstairs this evening from 18.30 – 18.45 but he had no one visit to seek advice. He would continue to have his surgery monthly.

Mr Newman said he'd been speaking in the past year to the Fife Council official who had responsibility for the former pet shop and there was a hope that the premises might be used by the Tourist Board currently in Market Square as this would give a good income to the CGF. Mr Newman supported Dr Shepherd's idea but was worried that the CC would need to become an employer. Dr Shepherd replied that there were a couple of organisations looking for offices and he thought they might be able to sub-tenant the premises providing a presence. Dr Shepherd then asked if the Fife Councillors could say anything more about the future of the council workers from the St Marys Place office and he'd noted that Fife Council had taken the Pet shop off the letting market. He wondered therefore whether Fife Council was planning to use the former Pet Shop once they'd vacated St Marys Place?

Cllr Thomson reported that he had heard a bit more news about the situation with regard to St Marys Place from an officer. The sale was in the early stages and a definite sale was not certain at this time for a variety of reasons. He acknowledged that the Council was looking at the possibility of relocating staff to the old pet shop might be one location as could the library.

Mr Jamie McLeod thought Dr Shepherd's idea was a good one and supported the idea of a presentation in March.

Dr Goudie thought that Holy Trinity was another possible place for community use when art of the church takes on non-secular functions. He thought that these areas would cost more than a peppercorn rent. The committee looking at the future of the Church is considering all this. In relation to the issue of consultation mentioned earlier by Dr Shepherd he commented that this was only worth doing if something statistically reliable was produced.

Dr Shepherd acknowledged Dr Goudie's comments on statistics and said that the CC was going to have to analyse their findings and audit what it did and if it didn't meet the community's needs give it up. Dr Shepherd thought that the time had come where Facebook didn't cover it all and the CC did need to be seen to be engaging with the community in some form. He thought that the former pet shop would be a great shop window for the activities of the CC and other groups using possibly keen to use it. He felt that St Andrews desperately needed a community centre with various facilities. Mr McLeod asked Dr Shepherd if he was prepared to take on board the research of this possible centre? Mr Newton said he supported the idea but felt it required a lot more detail to see if it would be viable.

Cllr Thomson suggested approaching Mr Alan Paul of Property Services about the premises. Cllr Liston reminded the meeting that if the premises were used at a peppercorn rent it would be income lost to the CGF. If Fife Council decided to use it as an office they should pay the full appropriate rent for use of the premises.

It was also confirmed that the CC should invite the Communities Officer from Fife Council to the March meeting. A presentation and questions for 15-20 minutes was agreed.

9. Reports from Office Bearers

9.1. Chair

Mr McLeod reported he'd attended the St Andrews in Bloom AGM in January and had submitted an article for St Andrews in Focus next edition.

9.2. Treasurer

Latest balance etc is on the web site. Mr Munn reminded members of the need to cash cheques before the end of the financial year.

10. Any Other Competent Business

10.1. Event at Craigtoun Park

Mr Roberts mentioned that a large event was being proposed for Craigtoun Park on the 7th April. Students who had set up a company to handle the event were setting up the event. The organisers were hoping to sell 2500 tickets. The organisers had approached the Friends of Craigtoun and it was agreed though not unanimously to allow the event to go ahead. The event will be in one section of the park and will be fenced off from the rest of the park, which will also be open that day. Mr Roberts thought that the organisers seemed very professional but they will still have to meet a number of conditions before they can get a licence. Mr Roberts concluded by saying that if the organisers could meet all required conditions and obtained a licence Friends of Craigtoun would have no objection.

10.2. Student Representative Report & Farewell

Mr McLeod noted that student representative Community Relations Officer Hannah Raleigh would be finishing her time on the CC in the near future. He asked Hannah to give a report on the Xmas Market held by the Student Association.

Hannah explained that she would be stepping down, as CRO and her successor would take over at the end of February. She would bring her successor along for the March meeting and introduce them to the CC. She thanked the CC for the opportunity to work with them in a variety of ways from the Coffee Morning to the Senior Citizens Treat. The Xmas Market had been a great success she said with over 9000 people attending.

10.3. Army Exercise

Mrs Corbin advised the CC to be aware of an exercise being run which would involve helicopters flying around and other activity.
